Notes	List is of birds seen in Busey/CL most falls plus any new species from this fall.
9/1	An interesting but frustrating start to the fall bird walks. Busey Woods was full of small flocks of warblers. They were however mostly up high in well leaved trees against a gray sky. We had only glimpses of them. One of the birders, Jeff, was very quick with his camera, and the ones he captured were most of the ones we were able to identify. Checking out a down low warbler in a dense bush, we found that it was a Common Yellowthroat upset by a young garter snake. Later an agitated Wilson's Warbler was in the same bush. Probably its eye was also on the snake.
9/8	Highlight of the day was an Olive-sided Flycatcher sitting out in full view. Also spotted was a sleeping Nighthawk high overhead on a bare branch. Janet Jokela birding on her own in Busey later found a Black-throated Blue Warbler.
9/15	A cold start at 52 degrees, but a beautiful day. Crystal Lake Park was very quiet, but the Cedar Waxwings have returned in force along with flocks of robins. Honeysuckle berries are the big attraction, although the waxwings were busy fly catching. Later in the morning a small group checked out Busey and found many warblers and thrushes.
9/22	This list comes from Greg Lambeth, and doesn't include the more common resident species. The group began in Busey and then moved on to Crystal Lake. Both were rather quiet.
9/29	The most exciting hike this fall. The park and woods were full of birds, particularly warblers. This was due to a cold front plus rain which dropped the migrants down in our area. Fall color beginning to show in our distressed trees. Highlights were the numbers of Scarlet Tanagers (est 20+), 2 Black-throated Blue Warblers, and a Mourning Warbler.
10/6	The day started out cloudy but gradually cleared. Groups of Blue Jays kept flying overhead just above the treetops. This is typical diurnal migration for them and we counted around 50 total heading south. A Yellow-throated Warbler was a late find. There were also 2 Black-throated Blue Warblers (same individuals as last week or new arrivals?) Greg heard a Red-shouldered Hawk calling before the hike. We have no fall records of this species since my records beginning in 2006. Titmouse and Yellow-throated Warbler are also additions to the fall Busey/CLP list.
10/13	Greg said it well in his e-mail "There had been a big turnover since last week with many of our warblers moving on and a "late fall" mix taking its place." An unusual critter for the morning was a chipmunk chipping from the underbrush. I don't remember ever seeing or hearing a chipmunk in Busey/CLP. One of the party had one in her yard recently, also an unusual event.
10/20	Good looks at Orange-crowned warblers, plus a few other lingering warbler species. A cold, quiet day at first but the Birds became more active as the temperature rose. Next week is the last Sunday hike until next March.
10/27	A quiet day for the last of our fall Busey Walks. Throughout the fall hikes we have seen a total of 107 different species of birds. This week saw 5 new arrivals, most warblers have gone and the new arrivals included 3 new sparrows plus Winter Wren and a very cooperative Red-breasted Nuthatch. Large flocks of robins and Cedar Waxwings were feeding on the abundant Honeysuckle berry crop. See you the first Sunday in March 2014 if not sooner.
10/29	A bonus hike by the Natural Areas Study group who decided not to go to the planned destination of Decatur's Rock Springs. We walked Crystal Lake Park and found the Winter Wren by the Magic Bridge. There was a large, diverse flock of birds by the bank near the Nature Center. I sat there for some time and that's where most of the bird sightings come from. Nuthatches kinglets, woodpeckers, creepers, purple finches, yellow-rumped and 2 orange-crowned warblers all busy feeding together. Beth
